A warm welcome from the Office of Institutional Advancement

We wanted to take a moment to share with you more about the work of the Advancement Office.

Our goal is to strengthen and advance the mission of Professional Children's School, primarily through raising philanthropic support for the school.

As a private, not-for-profit school, tuition covers most of the cost of a PCS education, but it doesn't provide for the full cost. Additionally, the need for financial aid continues to increase. In the coming 2020-2021 academic year, 45% of PCS students are receiving need-based financial aid to attend PCS.

Each year, hundreds of caring members of our community contribute unrestricted gifts through the Fund for Professional Children's School, gifts to our Financial Aid Fund and other special funds for financial aid, contributions toward other special initiatives, and underwriting for and attendance at the Spring Gala. Unrestricted gifts go toward meeting PCS's most pressing immediate needs.

Our office works with current parents, grandparents, trustees, along with alumni and alumni parents and grandparents, and others in the PCS community, to raise the remaining costs to make a PCS education possible for more students.

In this year's Annual Report on Giving, we are pleased to honor Dr. James Dawson's 25th year as Head of School. Dr. Dawson's impact on PCS is truly immeasurable. We congratulate him on this remarkable milestone and we look forward to seeing the school continue to flourish under his leadership.

From the Head of School

It's never meant to be easy to encapsulate 25 years of anything in a few words; there's so much to pull from, so many memories to recover, so many people and lives and moments and highlights to pull back out from the recesses of one's mind, so many engrams of memory and emotion that propel one back and prompt one to relive and to re-feel and to refresh the sense of belonging that, above all else, the exercise itself reminds one that that rush of feelings and that rush of emotions are, in and of themselves, a marker of the sheer magnitude of time and experience that defines a quarter century of doing anything, anywhere.

I remember how I felt on July 1, 1995 when I began my first day as Head of School at Professional Children's School; it was a very quiet day, mostly consumed by saying hello to the staff that I would come to know and cherish, getting the lay of the land, beginning the process of making an empty space into one's own office, figuring out the how's and the whys of operations that preceded my arrival, only later to realize that some of those operations would change to reflect an era that I could never imagine that I would lead and set.

I remember the trepidation of a thirty-something new head of a school as I took on the mantle of leadership for an institution that was facing considerable challenges at the time; I remember losing two close friends to the scourge of AIDS shortly before I came to PCS as it was only around that time, in the mid-90's, that protease inhibitors came along and gave promise to the ill and to the uncertain. I remember the huge challenges that were set out before me: to propel PCS forward, to bring more



and stronger students to the school, to raise our academic profile, to elevate our fundraising beyond perfunctory, and to work to improve the physical plant. The list seemed endless and a bit daunting. But it was always, from that first day onward, about promise, and it was always and remains to be about one central idea that has sustained me these many years and which still fills me with an unlimited sense of possibility.

If I had to find that one word that captures what my time at PCS has been all about and which remains the central theme of my work here, it has always been the same as it remains now. That word, that sentiment, that driving force has been and will always be hope.

During that first fall of '95 and in the 25 years since, I have had the most cherished privilege of meeting, working with, engaging with, being elevated by, and being touched by the simply most remarkable and extraordinary young people that I can imagine. Gifted dancers, musicians, artists, writers, models, athletes, entrepreneurs, influencers, pop stars and movie stars, special effect mayens and those who march to their

own beat. I've been so incredibly moved by what the young people entrusted to us can do, by what they have done, and by what they will do. I've been graced to keep in touch with so many of them, been called an honorary dad and older brother by scores of them, which so touches my heart; I've been present through the deeply personal journeys for numerous young people challenged by their own life stories, sometimes so driven by conflict and limitations. I remember the everlasting sentiments of those whose lives seemed so devoid of possibility and hope and who somehow envisioned that PCS or those of us who work here changed them for the better through our presence. Many, many years ago, a young man whose father walked out on him as a child wrote to me, "Dr. Dawson, you are for me like the absent father that I never had who has taught me the true meaning of love".

Wow, can any job, any work, any place be so powerful a reminder of how much we can touch others and an even stronger reminder about how much their lives can touch ours?

Countless stories, countless and abundant connections, countless ongoing examples of achievement and promise and happiness.

We've come far in these twenty-five years. During my time at PCS we've raised well over 45 million dollars; we've improved our academics; we remade our building,



expanding it by over 50% and added new spaces such as the Peter Glenville Theatre and the gym, with new labs and new classrooms, advanced technology, and wonderful new windows. We've grown and nurtured (and are forever grateful for) an extraordinary group of faculty and staff. Our endowment and reserves have grown dramatically. Our standing as a school has risen mightily. I've served as President of the Board of Directors of the Guild of Independent Schools of NYC and as President of the Board of Trustees of the New York State Association of Independent Schools: I've been on several school Boards as well as those of national organizations and chaired numerous accreditations visits; I've watched this tiny gem become like a brilliant diamond of light and life. I've had the pleasure of working with a series of superb Chairs and Boards of Trustees: whose generosity and support sustain me and sustain the school.

I'm also well aware and truly blessed to have been here to steward us through a quarter century of ups and downs economically, socially and globally. We've known the scourge of disease and hunger and wars but we've also known the wonder of scientific breakthroughs,

of immeasurable acts of kindness, and the recently blossoming desire to strive to push back against social inequity and systemic racism. I'm extraordinarily blessed to have been here through all of that and more, to have worked with so many remarkable professionals, to have been the grateful recipient of the financial gifts of our many supporters, including all of you listed herein and more. Through it all, I could feel the love, and this past spring, even if we could not hold our so carefully planned Gala meant to honor my 25 years of service, not to worry as I do feel honored, and I am deeply grateful, and I do feel the support, and I am touched by the gestures and the affirmation of this beloved community. Clearly, our journey is not complete. In the midst of a global pandemic, PCS is again confronted by a new set of challenges. I recognize that there is still much to do. Our work continues. But, behind all of that, my greatest gift is, without question, the joy and the privilege of working with and getting to know the young people entrusted to us here at PCS. They are the core and most cherished gift of my service and my time and they are the basis for my

optimism. They elevate me, they move me, they inspire me, they are my heroes, my unbridled solution to the dilemmas coming at us in an uncertain future. They touch all of us, with their minds and their talents and their humanity. They represent a world out there that shines like a light leading us forward and their light gives life to all of us.

I have said it before and I will say it again and again. What have these 25 years left me feeling? What is my takeaway after a quarter of a century at the helm of this remarkable institution called PCS? What drives me forward more than anything else, even in the midst of this particularly challenging time? It's always been the same.

I still believe in that place called hope.



THE DAWSON FUND HAS PROVIDED NEARLY \$500,000 IN SUPPORT TO 19 STUDENTS

In 1914 when Professional Children's School was founded, schools in New York were either unwilling or unable to accommodate the schedules of schoolaged children working on the stage, in spite of a large number of children employed in the theatre industry in New York or on the road. Many working children chose to skip or even quit school in order to continue practicing their craft. PCS was founded specifically to serve New York's professional children.

Our mission to educate students pursuing a variety of extracurricular endeavors has remained constant. However, as tuition has risen and as Broadway contracts for minors have shortened, PCS has served ever fewer students from the Broadway community. In 2014, as PCS celebrated both the school's centennial and Dr. James Dawson's 20th year as Head of School, Dr. Dawson requested that gifts contributed in recognition of both milestones be directed to a new fund whose goal was to help make PCS more affordable for students working in theatre and in the arts, and particularly to attract more students from the Broadway community.

Thanks to the very generous support of our donors, the Dr. James Dawson Fund for Financial Aid has now awarded more than \$475,500, enabling 19 PCS students to pursue their dreams without sacrificing their education. During this time, Dawson scholars have graced the Broadway stage, in productions including Frozen, Finding Neverland, Once on this Island, Matilda, Mary Poppins, Kinky Boots, and School of Rock. It has also supported students in television and film.



This year as we celebrate Dr. Dawson's 25th year as Head of School, Dr. Dawson has asked the PCS community to help replenish this important fund and to officially broaden its purpose so as to include a wider spectrum of students with financial needs. 1982: Received his Ph.D. from the State University of New York at Albany where he also served on the faculty.

1988-1995: Served as Head of the Upper School at The Spence School.



1995: Appointed Head of School of Professional Children's School. (*Dr. Dawson is shown above with the leadership team from his first year.*)

2001: Instituted a Travel Grant for two members of our faculty and staff each year to support personal or professional development through travel experiences.

2003-2005: Elected President of the Guild of Independent Schools of New York City.

2004: PCS completed a \$13.6-million renovation and expansion, which expanded the school building's usable space by 50%. The work, by Steven Harris Architects, added classrooms and office space, a new cafeteria, the Peter Glenville Theatre, and a gymnasium on a new 8th floor.

2010-2013: Significantly increased faculty and staff salaries over a period of three years, bringing them in line with peer independent schools.







DENISE JACKSON SUTHERLAND '69 WAS named Honorary Lifetime Trustee by the PCS Board of Trustees in recognition of her many years of service to the school.

Denise describes herself as a "proud PCS Alum, class of 1969." Denise attended PCS for high school while studying for a career in ballet. Upon graduation, she joined the Joffrey Ballet and enjoyed a 17-year career as a principal dancer.

Denise joined the PCS Board of Trustees as an Alumna Trustee in 1987. In 1997 she became the Chairman of the Board and served in that capacity for 10 years. Her tenure was marked by the \$13.6-million renovation and expansion project which created the 2-story auditorium and a gymnasium on a then-new 8th floor. Denise retired from the Board in 2014.



Named and Restricted Funds

THE BOB AVIAN SCHOLARSHIP (ESTABLISHED IN 1997)

Sir Cameron Mackintosh established this endowed scholarship fund to honor his friend and colleague, producer/choreographer Bob Avian. The scholarship is awarded to a PCS student with an interest in the field of dance and is based on academic and artistic merit.

CENTENNIAL FUND FOR THE FUTURE (ESTABLISHED IN 2012)

The Centennial Fund for the Future was created by the PCS Board of Trustees to raise funds toward paying off the School's IDA Bond.

THE DANI BRENNER '96 DARE TO DREAM FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2010)

The Dani Brenner Award, supported principally through the generosity of the Brenner family, is given annually in memory of PCS student Dani Brenner (1978-1995) to a member of the junior class for excellence in creative and expository writing.

THE GLADYS BROOKS FOUNDATION ENDOWMENT GRANT FOR THE LIBRARY (ESTABLISHED IN 1997)

This endowed fund supports the technological components of the PCS Library, allowing students access to the wide range of modern research resources.

THE DR. JAMES DAWSON FUND FOR FINANCIAL AID (ESTABLISHED IN 2014)

The Dr. James Dawson Fund for Financial Aid was created in honor and recognition of Dr. Dawson's twentieth anniversary as Head of School. The Fund's original purpose was to provide financial aid to students from the Broadway community who, without additional support, would be unable to afford a PCS education. The Fund was later broadened to support any PCS student in need of financial assistance in order to attend PCS.

THE EDWARD E. FORD FOUNDATION YOUNG DREAMERS FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2008) AND THE EDWARD E. FORD FOUNDATION ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP FUND (ESTABLISHED 1973, ADDITIONAL GRANT IN 1990)

These endowed funds provide tuition assistance for outstanding students in good standing with financial need.

FACULTY SALARY ENDOWMENT (ESTABLISHED WITH AN EDWARD E. FORD FOUNDATION GRANT IN 1981)

This endowed fund supplements faculty salaries, helping to keep them competitive with other independent schools. It allows the school to keep tuition at a reasonable rate while continuing to maintain an excellent professional staff.

FACULTY ENRICHMENT FUND (ESTABLISHED WITH AN EDWARD E. FORD FOUNDATION GRANT IN 1987)

This fund provides grants for faculty members to attend special workshops, seminars, and embark on special projects of their own design in order to further professional and personal growth.

FACULTY-STAFF TRAVEL GRANT FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2001)

Two grants annually are awarded to members of the full-time faculty and/or staff who have been continuously employed at PCS for a minimum of four years. Grants can be used for any purpose involving travel within the United States and/or international destinations. The grant program is designed to support travel to fulfill a personal or professional goal, and recipients are selected at the discretion of the Head of School.

Peter Glenville Theatre Fund (established in 2003) Established by a generous grant by the Peter Glenville Foundation, this fund provides ongoing operating support for PCS's Peter Glenville Theatre.

THE JACKSON FAMILY FUND FOR STUDENT SUPPORT (ESTABLISHED IN 2006)

This fund was created by PCS alumna and past Chairman Denise Jackson Sutherland '69, in memory of her parents Audrey Keppel Jackson '39 and John Henry Jackson '35. The fund supports student needs not covered by tuition assistance. Income from the fund provides for the purchase of books, transportation to and from school, eyeglasses, class trips, and other expenses beyond the reach of students with financial need.

THE CAROL KLEBAN FINANCIAL AID FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2013)

This fund was initially created in 2013 in honor of Carol Kleban's retirement from her position as Associate Head of School. Upon Ms. Kleban's untimely passing in June 2015, the Fund was rededicated to commemorate her life and career in recognition of her more than three decades of service to the PCS community.

THE NANCY MALONE '54 SCHOLARSHIP FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2013)

Established by alumna Nancy Malone to provide scholarship support to PCS students working in the dramatic arts.

THE ROBERT J. MARIANO '61 MEMORIAL FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2003)

Robert Mariano was the director of the first "All of Us" musical in 1960, with fellow students Marvin Hamlisch, Leslie Uggams, Christopher and Glen Walken and Lorin Hollander. The show evolved over the years into the annual Spring Benefit. In 2003, his many classmates and friends established this memorial fund to help support the building and operation of the Peter Glenville Theatre at PCS.

THE READER'S DIGEST-DEWITT WALLACE ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS (ESTABLISHED IN 1992)

This fund provides tuition assistance for students with financial need.

THE LAVINIA REESE FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2009)

An endowed fund providing need-based tuition assistance for PCS's African-American students was established with a bequest in December 2009 from Lavinia Reese. Ms. Reese was an employee of the School for more than 34 years until her retirement as business manager in November 2005.

THE SAPAR CONTEMPORARY ART SCHOLARSHIP FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2015)

The SAPAR Contemporary Art Scholarship was established to provide tuition support to a talented visual art student(s) who could not otherwise afford a PCS education.

SECOND CENTURY STEM INITIATIVE FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2014)

The Second Century STEM Initiative Fund was created to strengthen and deepen PCS's academic offerings in the areas of science, math, and technology in ways that benefit all students regardless of their possible careers.

THE VIRGINIA B. TOULMIN SCHOLARSHIP FUND (ESTABLISHED IN 2016)

The Virginia B. Toulmin Scholarship Fund was established through the generosity of the Virginia B. Toulmin Foundation to create the Toulmin Scholars Program, which provides annual financial aid awards to two female students in the performing arts, who otherwise would be unable to afford a PCS education.
